Overview

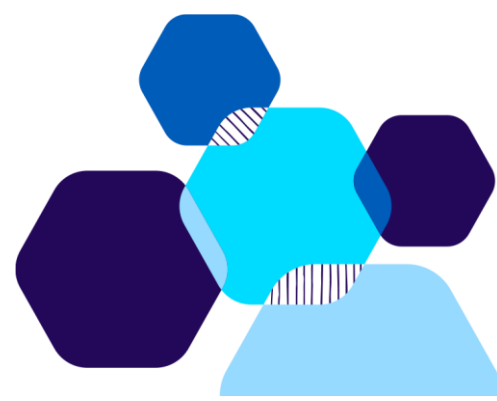
In this module, you'll explore why environmental issues should be a constant topic in your language classes and what benefits learners can get from discussing these topics. Then you'll look at how you can present key environmental terms and concepts to learners and different ways of introducing these topics you have at your disposal.

By the end of the module, you'll be able to:

- explain why it's important to include environmental issues in your classes
- describe the factors that motivate you to include environmental issues in your classes
- identify what benefits teaching environmental issues can bring to your learners
- identify key terms and concepts related to climate crisis and environmental issues
- explore the differences between global and local issues
- research and prioritise subject-specific terms and concepts according to your context
- analyse how to include environmental issues in your classes
- evaluate online resources about the environment to use with your learners
- reflect on the benefits of a proactive attitude to environmental issues.

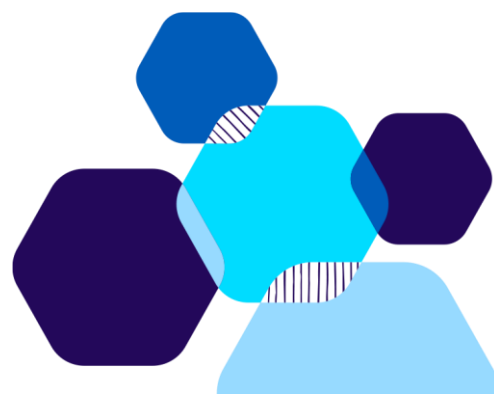

Overview

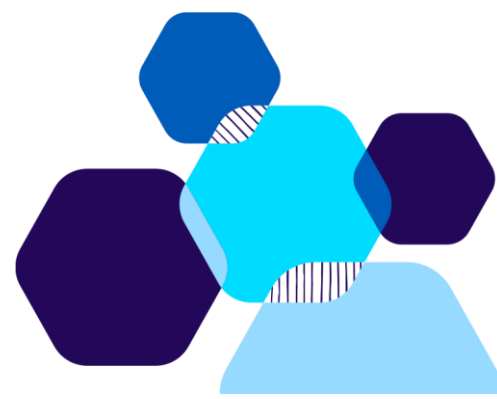

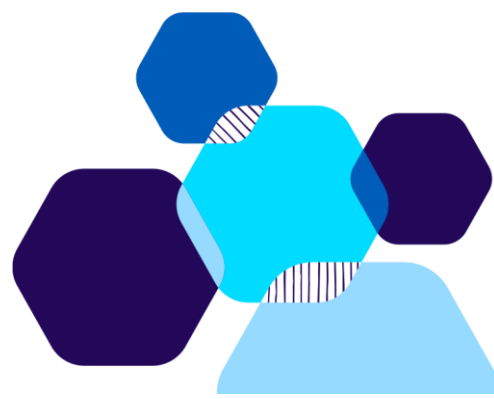

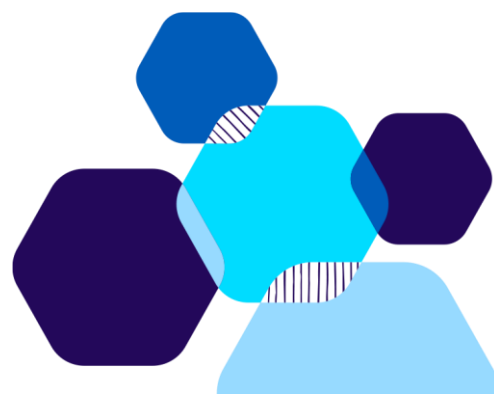
