# **Episode overview**

The focus of episode 6 is on educational institutions themselves, and what they can do to promote climate literacy. Our first guest is Asha Alexander, the dynamic principal of a large kindergarten in Dubai and UN climate champion who is a pioneer in climate literacy. In *From the Field,* we journey to Croatia to find out about 'The Green Schools Initiative', and how we can make environmental changes in our own schools.

Similarly, in our second interview, Beccy Wigglesworth from International House World talks about their environmental sustainability programme, joining Rose Aylett in reflecting on the role of the ELT industry as a whole in creating a more just world, and how language can be a central part of that. *The Green Glossary* takes us on a whistle-stop tour of localized varieties of English spoken around the world, looking at words including *kaitiakitangai* (Māori), *bayanihan* (Tagalog) and *jugaad* (Hindi).

# In this episode

Language education is more than just about teaching language, in this case English, it is part of a broader education.

You know, actually we can only, each of us, only do little things, but if we all do little things together it's a big thing.

Make the learning as tangible as possible.

Even as an adult, I had no idea of the extent of my ignorance regarding climate science.

Climate change is not felt or understood in India as it is in the West, and these differences in viewpoint must be taken into account when choosing words to use.







#### From the field

At the crossroads of central and southeast Europe, Croatia is a country of around four million people. As we learn in this episode's From the Field, its attitude towards recycling and the environment has been somewhat mixed. But in modern Croatia, there are many schools – and programmes such as the <u>Green Standard Schools initiative</u> – which are helping to change that.

# **Teaching ideas**

Why not use extracts from the podcast in your classroom? Here are some ideas of how you can use the interviews with Asha Alexander and Rose Aylett and Beccy Wigglesworth in episode 6.

#### Interview 1: Asha Alexander

#### Before listening: Introductory discussion task

Asha lives and works at a school in Dubai, in the United Arab Emirates. In groups, discuss what you think are some of the main climate-related issues of this location.

#### While listening: Notetaking task

Asha mentions the following topics in this conversation. Make notes about each of them:

- Climate change certification
- Climate literacy
- Climate responsibility
- Tree planting
- Her children's attitude to learning about the climate
- Hotel survey about food
- The Covid-19 pandemic
- Language learning and climate change

#### After listening: Contextualising task

Asha talks about a survey which her students did about wasted food in a local hotel. In groups, students should discuss what similar project they could do in their local area, or in their school.

This could then be done as a project, where students design and implement the research. They then have to report back to the rest of the class about what they did.

### **Interview 2: Rose Aylett and Beccy Wigglesworth**

#### Before listening: Reflecting on your environment

- 1. In groups, students should discuss the following questions:
  - Is your school environmentally-friendly? Why / why not?
  - Do you personally act in an environmentally-friendly way at school?
- 2. Ask students to share their views with the whole class.

#### While listening: Notetaking task

- 1. Beccy and Rose make the following statements in the conversation. In each case, students should think about: (a) what she means, and (b) whether they agree with her:
  - a) 'If everybody in the world does something, even if it's a little thing, then together that contributes to a big impact all over the world.' (Beccy)
  - b) 'We all know that part of being a human these days has a detrimental effect on the environment.' (Beccy)



- c) '[One of the main roles of education is ...] preparing critical global citizens, and students who are really interested in taking an active and positive role in the world.' (Rose)
- d) 'Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it's the only thing that ever has.' (Rose)

#### **After listening: Contextualising task**

- 1. Beccy talks about the 'Protecting our planet' badge which schools can get for promoting good environmental practices. Ask students to find out more about this programme by visiting <a href="International House">International House</a>. If this is not possible, share with them the main ideas.
- 2. In the same groups, students discuss what changes could be made at your school which would mean they could be eligible for this badge.

Tagalog	A language which has around 24 million native speakers. A further 45 million people speak it as a second language.
Jacinda Ardern	The Prime Minister of New Zealand / Aotearoa since 2017.
Loanword	A word adopted from a foreign language with little or no modification. Commonly-used loanwords in English include <i>cafe</i> (from French), <i>bazaar</i> (Persian), <i>kindergarten</i> (German), <i>opera</i> (Italian), <i>lava</i> (Hawaiian English Creole), <i>patio</i> (Spanish), <i>tsunami</i> (Japanese), <i>chocolate</i> (Nahuatl), <i>yin</i> and <i>yang</i> (Chinese), and <i>moped</i> (Swedish).
Māori	The indigenous Polynesian people of mainland Aotearoa / New Zealand.
