Read the text and discuss the questions.

Lies, lies, lies...

According to research, the average person tells 4 lies every day.

That means they lie 28 times a week and more than a hundred times a month.

That's over a thousand lies a year. So, what's the number one lie?

- 2. Why do you think people lie so much? What is their motivation?
- 3. How many lies have you told this week?

- 5. Can you think of a situation when it's okay to tell a lie?

### Task 1 - The characters in Shakespeare's Much Ado About Nothing

a. Read about the characters in the play, and answer the questions on the next page.

**Beatrice** is a strong, funny and clever woman. She says she doesn't ever want to have a husband, and spends a lot of time using her sharp wit to make fun of Benedick.

Beatrice is very loyal to her cousin Hero. When she hears stories about Hero, she is shocked, and swears that they are not true. Although she is quick witted and intelligent, she is still easily fooled into thinking that Benedick is in love with

**Benedick** is also in the army, and just like Beatrice, he's witty and funny and has no interest in getting married. He says that if he ever gets married that his friends should 'put him in a bottle and shoot him'! He loves to argue and make clever jokes with Beatrice.

Benedick is gullible though, and when his friends tell him that Beatrice is in love with him, he believes them. He finally falls in love with her and marries her at the end of the play.

**Claudio** is a young, brave and handsome soldier. He falls in love with Hero at first sight. However, he also believes lies very quickly.

Don Pedro arranges for him to catch his fiancé Hero being unfaithful, and Claudio is deceived. He believes the lies about her and treats her very badly at the church. When Claudio thinks Hero is dead, he regrets what he did.

The duke's daughter, **Hero**, is from a wealthy and important family. She's Innocent and quiet, even when Claudio accuses her of being unfaithful although she denies this is true.

After Hero pretends to be dead, Claudio admits that he was wrong to believe she was unfaithful. She marries Claudio at the end of the play but the wedding is filled with deception.

### Task 2 - The plot of Much Ado About Nothing

Read a summary of the plot. With a partner, discuss how many lies you can find in the play.

#### A summary of Much Ado About Nothing

After Don Pedro wins a war against his half-brother Don John, he and his soldiers arrive in the beautiful city of Messina to stay with a wealthy and powerful duke. One of his Don Pedro's soldiers, Claudio, falls in love with the duke's daughter, Hero, and they decide to get married.

For a joke, Hero and a group of her friends decide trick her sarcastic cousin Beatrice that another soldier, Benedick, is in love with her. Don Pedro also decides to trick Benedick that Beatrice is in love with him. He also wants to have a bit of fun at his friend's expense and thinks that Benedick needs to get married.

Don John, who lost the war, wants to spoil the wedding and he tricks Don Pedro and Claudio into believing that Hero has been unfaithful before the wedding. Claudio refuses to marry Hero on her wedding day and publicly insults her. Filled with grief, Hero's family pretend that she is dead in the hope the truth will come to the surface. Soon enough they find out that she was innocent and Claudio feels very bad about his actions.

To compensate for his actions, Claudio agrees to marry someone else but he is not allowed to see her face at the wedding. Claudio gets married without seeing who the bride is and then, he is amazed with joy when he discovers that the woman is in fact Hero and he has already married her. Happily, Beatrice and Benedick actually fall in love and at the end of the play she accepts his marriage proposal.

# Task 4 – Reading a scene

**a.** Look at this picture from a film of Much Ado About Nothing. What are the characters holding, and how do you think this is important in the plot?

**b.** In pairs, read this scene from Much Ado About Nothing, and find out what Beatrice and Benedick are holding, and why

BENEDICK Which is Beatrice?

BEATRICE [Unmasking] I answer to that name. What is your will?

BENEDICK Do not you love me?

BEATRICE Why, no; no more than reason.

BENEDICK Why, then your uncle and the prince and Claudio have been deceived; they swore you did.

BEATRICE Do not you love me?

BENEDICK Troth, no; no more than reason.

BEATRICE Why, then my cousin Margaret and Ursula are much deceived; for they did swear you did.

BENEDICK They swore that you were almost sick for me.

BEATRICE They swore that you were well-nigh dead for me.

BENEDICK 'Tis no such matter. Then you do not love me?

BEATRICE No, truly, but in friendly recompense.

LEONATO Come, cousin, I am sure you love the gentleman.

CLAUDIO And I'll be sworn upon't that he loves her; For here's a paper written in his hand, A halting sonnet of his own pure brain, Fashion'd to Beatrice.

HERO And here's another, Writ in my cousin's hand, stolen from her pocket, Containing her affection unto Benedick.

BENEDICK A miracle! here's our own hands against our hearts. Come, I will have thee; but, by this light, I take thee for pity.

BEATRICE I would not deny you; but, by this good day, I yield upon great persuasion; and partly to save your life, for I was told you were in a consumption.

BENEDICK Peace! I will stop your mouth. [Kissing her]

#### Task 6 - Discussion

Read the situations. Discuss whether you think it is 'acceptable' or 'unacceptable' to lie in these situations.

- A child who lies to his mother that he likes the food she cooks... even though what she cooks is terrible!
- A husband who lies to his wife that he is working late at the office when really, he is watching football with his friends.
- 3. A teacher who lies to her students saying that they are learning English very well when, in fact, they are not learning very fast at all.
- **4.** A worker who lies to their boss that they were late because the traffic was very bad. In fact, they overslept.
- 5. A wife who lies to her husband that she loves the new shoes he bought her when, really, she thinks they looks awful and she will never wear them.
